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FOREWORD

he year 2005 saw the percentage of foreign trained nurses fall to below 20% for the first time in 8 years. Efforts to attract and retain locally trained nurses in the profession seem to have come to fruition. While developed countries are seeing an increase in the number of nurses from other countries working in their healthcare institutions, Singapore seems to have bucked the trend. However, we cannot be complacent if we do not want to see a reversal in the trend. The introduction of a second nursing diploma course to prepare registered nurses will enhance the number of local graduates.

Developed countries are also seeing the ageing of their nursing workforce. Compared to nurses working in developed countries like Australia, Canada, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and the United States, where the average age is more than 40 years, the average age of nurses working in Singapore is 35 years.

Although Singapore does not have a degree course in nursing, the number of nurses with higher qualifications has increased. Most local nurses who obtained their post-registration nursing degree completed their studies locally in an off-shore programme. A small number went overseas to obtain their nursing degree.

The profile of nurses in Singapore has improved over the years and this augurs well for the profession. We need to continue in our efforts to make nursing an attractive and rewarding vocation, and contribute to the health of the nation.

HIGHLIGHTS IN 2005

Regulations

The Nurses and Midwives (Amendment) Act was passed in Parliament on 21st April 2005. The key amendments were to allow for the setting up of an Advanced Practice Nurse Register and to regulate advanced practice nurses.

The other amendments include allowing the Board to prescribe compoundable offences and to compound offences. It also allows the Board to invest its surpluses and ensure prudent management of reserves.

Traditionally, the Board is chaired by the Director of Medical Services. The amendments provide for the Director of Medical Services or his representative to be a member of the Board. This will open up the possibility of appointing a nurse or any other member as the Chairman.

Nursing Education

On 24 May 2005, nursing education in Singapore received a boost: a second diploma course to prepare registered nurses was implemented. Ngee Ann Polytechnic offered a 3-year course leading to a Diploma in Health Sciences (Nursing).

International Meetings

Registrar and Executive Secretary attended the 7th International Regulation Conference on the Regulation of Nursing and Midwifery and the 23rd International Council of Nurses' Quadrennial Congress in Taipei. The International Regulation Conference brought together global representatives of nursing boards and councils. Key issues addressed were globalization and its impact on professional regulation, application of GATS, domestic regulations and mutual recognition agreements.

The theme of the 23rd Quadrennial Congress was "Nursing on the move: knowledge, innovation and vitality". A wide range of papers was presented. In addition to the issues addressed at the Regulation Conference, key papers on health and human rights, benefits of technologies for better health, communicable diseases, counterfeit medicines, issues underpinning global nursing imbalances and shortages, advanced practice nursing and trends in nurses' pay and working conditions were also presented.

The Singapore Nursing Board is assisted in its functions by various committees: Registration, Education, Complaints, Finance and Audit.

REGISTRATION

During the year, the number of nurses on the Register and Roll saw an increase of 4% over the preceding year from a total of 19,329 in 2004 to 20,167 in 2005. The composition of nurses and midwives is illustrated in Chart 1.



A total of 1828 nurses and midwives were registered during the year (Table 1). This was an increase of 11% compared to 2004. Singaporeans comprised 43% and permanent residents 8% of the number of new registrants. Compared to 2004, this was a marked increase¹. There was a 17% decrease in the number of foreign nurses and midwives registered.

¹ In 2004, Singaporeans formed 31% (506 nos.), permanent residents 4% (60 nos.) and foreigners 66% (1075 nos.) of the total new registrants.

Licensure Examinations for Foreign Trained Nurses and Midwives

The Board conducted 12 licensure examinations in Singapore, Philippines, China and India. There was an increase of 9.4% over the previous year in the number of nurses and midwives who sat for the examination. Table 3 shows that out of a total of 1242 candidates who sat for the examination, 990 passed.

Table 3: No. of nurses and midwives who sat for the licensure examinations





COMPLAINTS

During the year, the Complaints Committee held one hearing into allegations of negligence against a registered nurse over the death of a patient resulting from adverse reaction to a medication. The Committee found that she failed to observe a fundamental practice of medication administration expected of a Registered Nurse. Giving due consideration to the circumstances that she was working under, the Board decided to impose a six-month suspension on her.



FINANCE

The audited financial statements reported a healthy state with a net surplus of \$263,520. Cash flow remained healthy with the bulk related to operating activities.

Income

Corresponding with the increased number of nurses on the Register and Roll, income increased by 15% to \$1,027,357 over the preceding year. Practising certificate fees (79.7%) continued to be the main source of revenue.

Expenditure

Expenses decreased by 3% to \$710,897 from the preceding year as the result of overall decrease in operating expenditure. No legal fees were incurred during the year.







RNs by Age, Marital Status and Activity Status











ENs by Age, Marital Status and Activity Status










